A brief content of the course

Designing of the subject of History of Religion as a contemporary and important science provides knowledge for mutual cooperation between different religions and faiths of the contemporary world to advance further the culture and human civilisation. Related to this science, the American lawyer Thomas Clark, in 1963, had stated before the court that: "it can be freely said that one's education will not be full without studying the comparison of religions or history of religions". Therefore, some contemporary scholars define the history of religions rightly as a comparative history of religions, considering that it is not simply a historical study, but at the same time is also a comparative study. Having in consideration that the religion has coexisted with us along the history, by answering most complicated questions that a human being can have made, then undoubtedly we can say that as many times we return and seek human conscience, we see that it is closely interrelated with the religion.

Aims and expected learning outcome:

1. Knowledge for setting up bases of history of religion by the Muslim scientists and those from the West in 19th century.
2. Knowledge on the most spread concepts of religion such as: monotheism, pantheism, dualism, polytheism, atheism etc.
3. Development of knowledge for the religions of antique peoples, Egypt, Antique Persia, India etc.
4. Acquisition of knowledge on prehistoric religions in Middle Asia - religions of Ancient Mesopotamia.
5. Acquisition of knowledge on religions in Old Anadol.

6. Knowledge on old religions in Arabia – North, South and Middle Arabia.
7. Development of knowledge for old religions of Europe – Greeks, Romans, Tetons, Celts, Americans etc.
