### Course Description

The Qur'an course is one of the most important subjects at the Faculty of Islamic Studies, as the Qur'an is the fundamental foundation of Islam. The course includes three main components: memorization of the second Juz' of the Qur'an; correct recitation from various Surahs with the Mushaf open; and theoretical as well as practical rules of proper recitation (Tajweed). The course is interactive, engaging, and spiritual in nature.

### Course Objectives

- To connect the student with the Holy Qur'an through reading and memorization.
- To correct students during Qur'anic recitation.
- To provide theoretical and practical knowledge of Tajweed rules.
- To familiarize students with unfamiliar words encountered during recitation.

### Learning Outcomes

- Advancement in correct Qur'anic recitation.
- Theoretical and practical knowledge of Tajweed.

- Memorization of a considerable portion of the Qur'an, specifically 20 pages (the second Juz').
- Ability to describe the rules of proper Qur'anic recitation.
- Ability to teach others these competencies after completing all semesters.

### **Teaching Methodology**

The course will be delivered through lectures and interactive discussions, encouraging students through questions and analysis within the lecture framework. Projectors will be used for presenting knowledge in PowerPoint slides. Seminars and essays (individual and group) will be assigned, along with assessment tests. All of these will be complemented by practical implementation through student recitation before the professor. Students may contact the professor during course preparation for guidance to achieve quality learning and successful outcomes.

Tajweed: Secondary (non-natural) elongations.

Memorization: Surah Al-Baqarah pp. 30–31

Tajweed: Major connecting elongation.

Tajweed: Necessary elongation, its cases, types, and length. Method of reciting the symbolic letters at the beginning of some Surahs.
